What can or should I do before applying?

As well as taking complementary subjects at GCSE and further education, you should also explore what you can do outside of school. Extra-curricular activities are a fantastic way to develop creative skills, particularly if your school or college does not have drama, art, music or other specialist departments. Why not have a go at identifying the skills you need and then finding clubs, classes, summer schools and other activities that help develop these?

7. What happens next?

Preparing for interviews and auditions

Interviews and auditions are a very important part of the application process for creative, performing arts and design subjects. Think about which of your traits you'd like to highlight in your interview/audition and try to find examples to back this up. Relate it back to the course and try to predict any follow-up questions your interviewers/assessors might have.

8. What happens next?

After the interview or audition

It's crucial to think critically, or reflect, after each audition/interview. This will help you prepare for the next.

Think about what went well - so you will remember to repeat it- and what could have gone better – so you can be better prepared for next time. If it came up once, it's likely to come up again.

9. How do I choose?

Making a decision

Once your offers are in you need to decide which institution you want to attend. Through UCAS and UCAS Conservatoires this will mean selecting a 'Firm' and an 'Insurance' choice. For direct applications, it may be as simple as merely accepting the offer.
